



Must or Have to – Speaking

For each of these scenarios you can only use **must**, **mustn't**, **have to** or **don't have to** in the most appropriate form to give advice/recommendations/opinions/instructions:

<p>☞ You meet some friendly Australian tourists who are visiting your town/city/region. Recommend what you think they should or shouldn't do while they are there.</p>
<p>☞ You're training a new member of staff at your workplace. What are their responsibilities? How should they behave? What advice can you give them?</p>
<p>☞ You're hiring a new babysitter to look after your 5-year-old twin boys. Give the babysitter instructions on what they must and mustn't do.</p>
<p>☞ Explain the rules of your favourite game or sport.</p>
<p>☞ Your friend is organising their 30th birthday party. Share your thoughts on what venue, food, drink, activities, music and people they should incorporate into their celebrations.</p>
<p>☞ A friend has asked your advice about what information they should include in their CV. They are applying for a job as a waiter in an exclusive restaurant.</p>
<p>☞ Your son/daughter/parents have decided to spend the next 6 months travelling the world. Tell them which places you think they should visit and what they should do there.</p>
<p>☞ Some friendly aliens have landed in your garden. They are highly intelligent, but they are confused about how to behave when they meet people. Give them your advice about how to interact socially.</p>
<p>☞ You get stuck in a lift with your town mayor. Tell him/her all the things you think they need to do to improve life in your town.</p>
<p>☞ You are the character 'Q' in a James Bond film. You are presenting a new car to Bond and telling him about its special features and how he should use them – including what he must and mustn't do!</p>
<p>☞ You are planning a 4-day hike in the mountains with a group of friends. As an experienced mountaineer you advise on how they should prepare, what equipment and clothing they need what they should avoid doing etc.</p>
