<p>Completed actions in the past She drank her milk. He lived in Berlin for a long time.</p> <p>Repeated actions in the past They always went to France in the summer. We often finished work late.</p> <p>Actions happening in chronological order He folded his newspaper, finished his coffee and left the café.</p>	<p>An ongoing action around a particular time in the past (with past simple) He was living in Berlin <u>when</u> war broke out. I saw the fox <u>while</u> I was parking the car.</p> <p>Background events & descriptions in the past It was raining and people were rushing home. He was wearing an old brown coat.</p> <p>Shorter, temporary actions and situations in the past We met him while we were staying with our friends in Venice.</p>

<p>NEGATIVE: Subject + Auxiliary <i>had</i> + <i>not</i> + past participle I had not (hadn't) worked You had not (hadn't) worked He/She/It had not (hadn't) worked We had not (hadn't) worked They had not (hadn't) worked</p>	<p>NEGATIVE: Subject + Auxiliary <i>had</i> + <i>not</i> + past participle I had not (hadn't) been working You had not (hadn't) been working He/She/It had not (hadn't) been working We had not (hadn't) been working They had not (hadn't) been working</p>

PAST PERFECT SIMPLE USES	PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS USES
<p>To talk about something that happened before another event or action in the past. When he arrived, Jane had already left. We visited the house where Darwin had lived.</p> <p>In reported speech for the past She told him that she had called an hour ago. I said that I had left my bag on the train.</p> <p>To talk about "how long?" in the past, before another action or event. He had lived in New York for 13 years. I realised that I hadn't been to London since I was a child.</p>	<p>To talk about actions or situations that continued up to a time in the past. I had been living in the same flat for sixteen years before I had to move. When I saw Ella, I could see she had been crying. The builders had been working on the site since early that morning.</p>
